Greetings, sisters and brothers in Christ! Even as I write this I am in the midst of Christmas decorations and Christmas Eve planning. As you know, not much snow, but a beautiful time of year. Songs, colors, families gathering, and the joy of worship at the manger of our New-born King, Jesus. Amazing.

But now, when you are reading this, life has moved on. Decorations are put away, and we enter into a time of seasonal quiet – awaiting the joy of spring. In Worship, for the next several weeks (until February 14 – Valentine's Day AND Ash Wednesday) we will take a look at how God in Jesus "manifests" God's-self: through the gifts of the Magi, through His baptism, and into His teachings and miracles.

So: as you are putting away decorations; or still enjoying the outdoor lights; or making resolutions; or settling down for a "long winter's nap;" or planning how 2024 will be different, take a moment to stop and be present to the now. Pay attention to the people around you, to the sights and sounds and smells of this moment, and listen for the voice of the One who has come as a Babe, and in Whose death and resurrection you find life.

I will be in Honduras for the last half of this month, supporting those who bring medicine and clean water to those who have neither. Blessings to you as you find God's love in this new day, this new month, this new year!



Reports of Officers:

- Pastors report: Motion to accept application of Corey Bettenbrock to Bethlehem Lutheran Church made by Willie
- Treasurer's report: Treasurer Books were audited and all is well. Discussed collection envelopes and adding an announcement in the bulletin regarding needing/wanting envelopes, and best way to assess need for envelopes due to cost Discussed where to add instructions for online giving.

December 4, 2023 Imagining Renewal Microgrants

"I am about to do a new thing; now it springs forth, do you perceive it? I will make a way in the wilderness and rivers in the desert," Isaiah 43:19



2023 is the Year of Story, and some of the best stories from across Northwest Ohio have their genesis in the Imagining Renewal Microgrants initiative. Why are Microgrants so important?

Microgrants encourage God's people to dream new dreams. Microgrants seed mission and ministry beyond the four walls of our parishes. Microgrants help us connect with what God is already up to in the community.

And as Deacon Carolyn Steinfeldt shares in the story below, Microgrants are nurturing communities as they come together to do ministry together!

The members of Zion have long supported and volunteered at the local feeding ministries of the Sandusky community, and were aware that many of the recipients of the food pantry were homeless or living in temporary housing with no food prep facilities.

We realized that even when food is available, it is of no value if it can't be heated or prepared and that families, especially children, were going with little or no nourishment.

The NWO Synod Microgrant Zion received allowed for the purchase of 50+ crockpots to be distributed through Care & Share of Erie County to those who are in temporary housing in motels. Necessary cooking utensils, such as can openers, measuring cups and spoons, soap and a dish cloth were also included.

Local monetary donations for this ministry continue to come into Zion so that we are able to purchase more crockpots to be distributed through a local homeless shelter. When the residential families leave to establish their own homes, the facility sends them off with necessary supplies. They are excited to be able to add these crockpots to the other necessities provided.

Because of the initial microgrant, people were made aware of the need and this ministry continues to grow, with donations coming from not only the Zion community, but from others who have heard and want to contribute.

I invite you to come and enter the story and join Deacon Carolyn and myself by making a generous donation to Imagining Renewal Microgrants. Our goal is to raise \$100,000 to fully fund new Microgrant initiatives. Together, we can and do make a difference in Christ's name.

• 1 bath towel (approximately 52" x 27") dark color

recommended

- 2 bars of new bath size soap (4-5 oz.), any brand, in its original packaging
- 1 adult-sized toothbrush, in its original packaging*
- 1 sturdy comb, <u>wide tooth</u>, remove packaging
- 1 metal nail clipper, remove packaging

*Toothbrush multi-packs may be used by sealing an individual toothbrush in a business envelope, no plastic bags or wrap.

Do not add other items or leave out any of the items listed. All items should be new and in good condition.

Wrap all the items in the towel and tie securely with ribbons or yarn. Do not enclose the kit or any of its contents in plastic bags.


