"In like a lion, out like a lamb." So are the words about March. We have been able to say that because the beginning of this month was full of Winter and early-spring fury, and then Spring would dawn at the end of the month with beauty. Is this image true this year, or is the whole weather system different? But this year we can use the image of those two animals as we think like Jesus.

Until we finally get to the last day of March, we will be in Lent. We walk to the cross with Jesus, singing with other disciples, serving those in need, and giving God all the praise. We journey to the cross, finding out again that only in the death and Resurrection of Jesus do we find life, and hope, and joy.

Jesus is the Lion. He is Lion of Judah, the leader of God's people from before the beginning of time. As an apexpredator in creation, the lion symbolizes strength, leadership, and majesty. Even so, God-as-

Brothers and sisters, may this March, full of the fears of our world but even more so full of the fullness of God's grace, be one for you in which you are renewed in your faith, strengthened in your service, and blessed both to serve the Lion, and to serve like the Lamb!

## A Jam-Packed Month for Scouting in February

February was a busy month for Cub Scout Pack 344, and Scouts BSA Troops 344 & 9344 all of whom Bethlehem Lutheran Church is the chartering organization for.

The events started on the weekend of February 2 where Troops 344/9344 hosted and participated in the Wood District Klondike Derby at Camp Miakonda in Sylvania Township. The Troops competed in Scout skill challenges and the sled race. Attendees also had a chance to hear from Eastwood High School's own Marine Lt. Colonel, Sarah Deal, who shared her background and some words to live by for the Scouts.

The weekend of February 9 had members of Troops 344/9344 heading to western New York for their annual ski trip. Participants stayed at a lodge at a Scout camp about an hours drive form the ski resort. They then had a fun-filled Saturday of skiing on the hills of the resort before returning home on Sunday afternoon.

On Sunday, February 18, Bethlehem celebrated Scout Sunday (see pic below). Scouts and families of the Pack and Troops were invited to join us for worship, as well as three Girl Scout Troops that meet in our Fellowship Hall. Scouts assisted in acolyting, greeting, reading and offering collection. Scouts and leaders that joined us were presented with a custom, laser engraved cross.

The weekend of February 23 saw members of Troops 344/9344 participate in Camp Alaska which is a opportunity unique to experience real winter survival. Scouts and leaders hiked into a campsite with their gear, food and cooking utensils; built a personal shelter that could

not be a manufactured tent; and stayed outside for 24 hours while practicing Leave-No-Trace camping.

The month ended with the Pack 344 Pinewood Derby on Saturday, February 24. Cub Scouts were given a Pinewood Derby kit back in December which consisted of a block of wood, pastic tires and nails (axles). Working with their families and leaders, they then created their car design.

February 12, 2024 God's Rhythm of Rest

And there was evening, and there was morning, the first day. And there was evening, and there was morning, the second day. And there was evening, and there was morning, the third day. (Genesis 1:5b, 8b, 13, 19, 23, 31b).



There is a sacred rhythm to God's created order. We know this story well, and we get the point of the creation narrative as it is recorded in the Book of Genesis, chapter 1. We think we know this story well, and we think we get the point. But actually, I'm not sure that we do.

Did you happen to notice that in the Book of Genesis each day begins not with the rising of the sun, but with the setting of the sun. Each day begins in the evening, which is then followed by the next morning. "And there was evening, and there was morning, the first day". Just pause for a moment and give that rhythm some consideration.

What if God, in this sacred rhythm of time, is asking us to begin our days, not with work, but with rest. In God's economy the gift of God's rest always comes first, which is then followed by the sacred gift of work.

From Genesis chapter 1, we learn an important principle to put into practice. "We are to work from our rest, and not rest from our work".

During these Forty Days of Lent, in this Year of Rest, I am going to ponder that principle, and ask God to help me to find ways to put it into practice. I invite you to come and join me. "We are to work from our rest, and not rest from our work".

## Mission Honduras By Darla Boyk and the Mission Honduras team

## Mission Honduras brigade- January 20-30<sup>th</sup>, 2024

We accomplished much during our January brigade! Thanks to your generosity, we were able to provide the gift of clean water to 200 new families, complete 599 filter checks, distribute over 300 filter sweaters, work closely with village advocates, and help provide care for 1255 patients. In addition, we distributed clothing, shoes, 1500 pounds of red beans and 1000 lbs. rice as well as 200 Mission Honduras "filter care" coloring books. We have now distributed 1800 filters since May 2018 which provide approximately 9000 people with access to clean water.

What's next? Megan and I will return in late May with the John Carroll University medical brigade. Megan will see patients with the John Carroll medical team while the filter team will focus on filter checks, especially the filters we distributed to new households in the past two years. We will distribute filters to new households as funding allows. Tentative dates for our 2025 brigade are January 24<sup>th</sup> – February 4<sup>th</sup>. You do have the option to return home on Saturday, February 1<sup>st</sup>. If you are interested in going to Honduras with us, please let me know. Finally, we will be holding a brunch to share stories from our trip with you and to thank you for your support.

#### Greetings From Honduras,

I first want to thank all of you for the time and effort that went into sending the care package out here for the holidays. All of the snacks and cookies have been devoured at the writing of this letter. The cookies were the first thing to go and I'm glad they were able to make the journey in one piecel The cow tails were great too because a lot of people in my unit haven't had them since they were back in school. Amazing items and we all greatly appreciated it!

Thankfully the job out here hasn't been too taxing compared to the other locations we could have been sent to. My job is to coordinate MEDEVAC aircraft for U.S. personnel when they are injured or if any natural disasters occur that require U.S. aid. One cool perk I've earned from this position is a patch that only our SERE personnel (Survival, Evasion, Resistance, & Escape) and PJ (Pararescue) personnel are permitted to wear. The patch is of an angel holding the globe to illustrate that 24/7 we stand-by for anyone that needs our help. We were given permission to wear it because of the coordination needed by us for the other units to do their jobs effectively. It's been an amazing opportunity to work out here with the other branches and strengthen foreign relations with the host country.

In my personal life, my wife and I are leaving Germany in August 2024. We will be returning somewhere back in the continental United States but as of right now, we don't know which base yet. Could be anywhere from California again to somewhere in the south like Mississippi or Florida. We were hoping to get somewhere close by like Wright-Patterson in Dayton, OH to be closer to family but Uncle Sam seems to have different plans for us. Regardless of where we go to next, we'll make the most of it.

I hope everything is going well back home and for all your families. I wish all of you a Merry Christmas and Happy New Year! My family appreciates the work you do for us, and it always makes me smile when I see that I've received something from home. Thank you for reaching out to me and thank you for your generous work.






